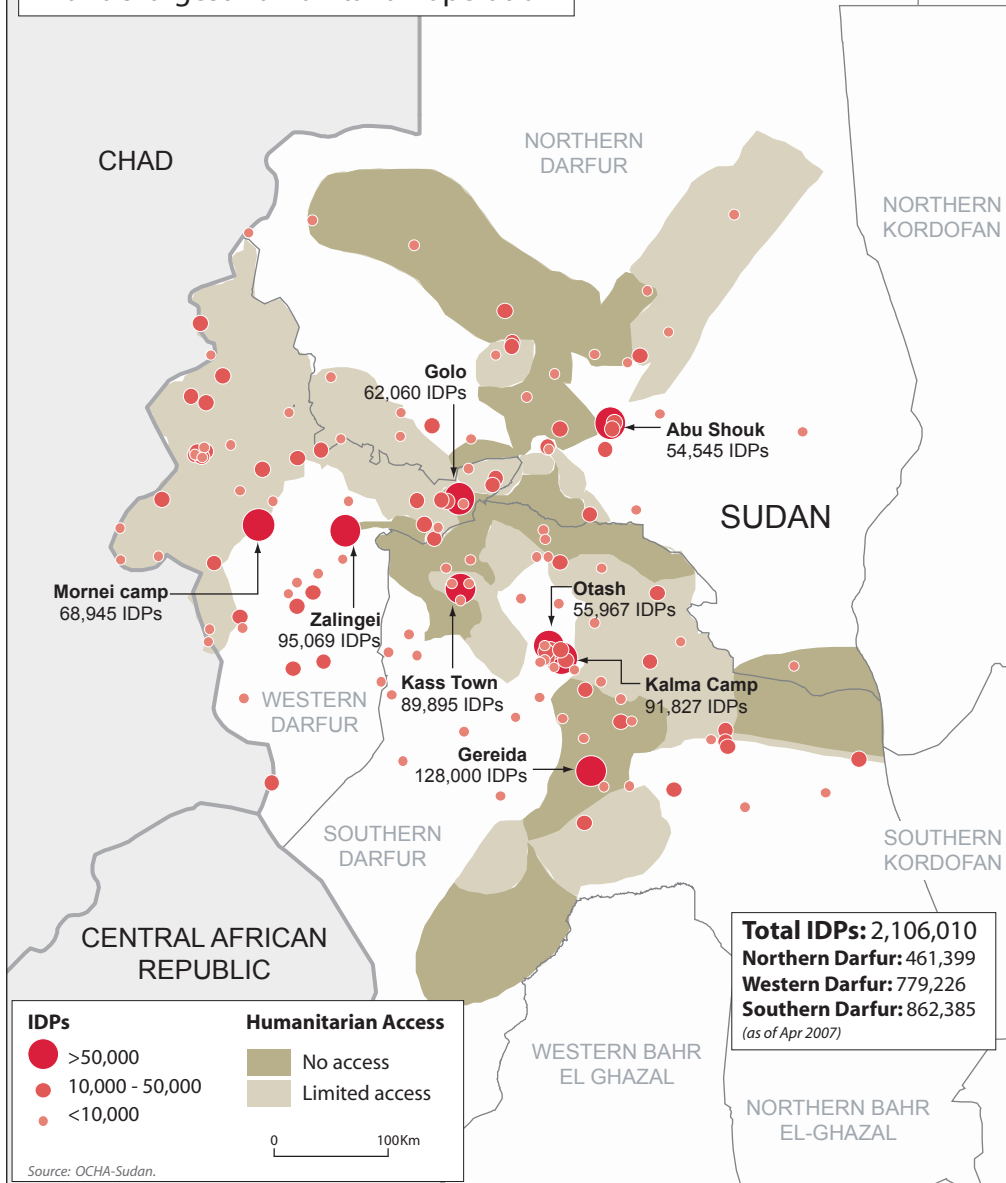


Sudan - Darfur: Humanitarian Profile - May 2007



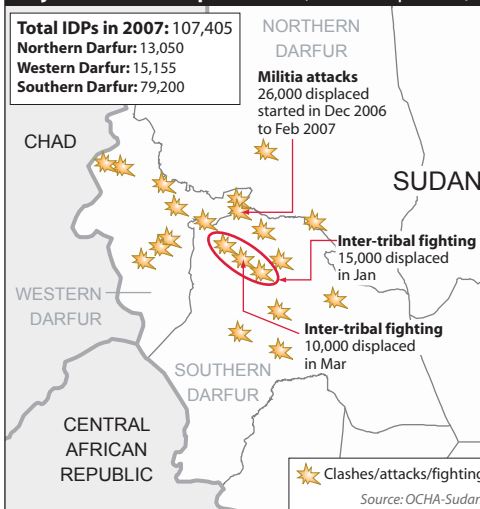
Internally Displaced Persons (as of Jan 07) and Humanitarian Access (as of Mar 07)

World's largest humanitarian operation



- Over past six months, 150,000 civilians forced to abandon their homes and seek refuge.
- IDPs fled to camps in all three Darfur states, in many cases already filled beyond capacity.
- Access deteriorated with surge in violence despite the signing of the Darfur Peace Agreement on 5 May 2006.

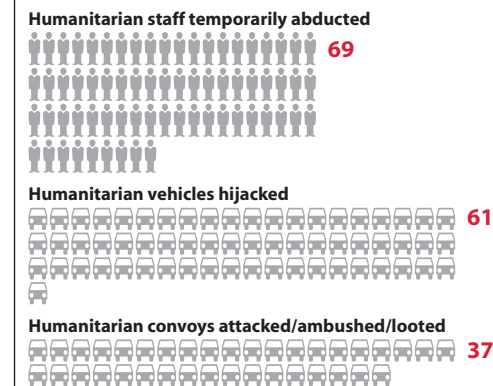
Major Causes of Displacement (1 Jan - 1 Apr 2007)



- Displacement primarily due to aerial bombardment, clashes between Government and rebel forces, militia attacks, Sudan Liberation Army related attacks and inter-tribal fighting.
- Sexual and physical assault on civilians reported on a daily basis.

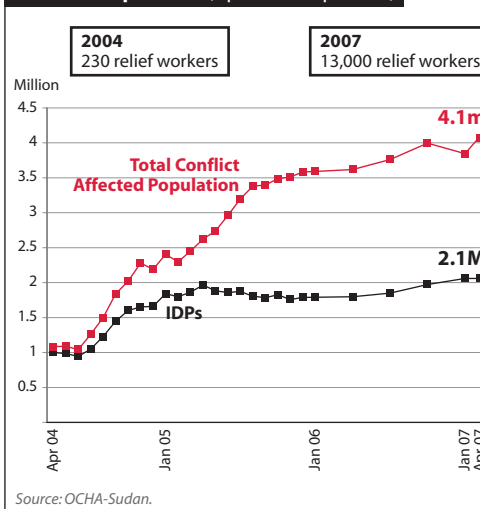
Reported Incidents in 2007 (as of 14 Jun 2007)

Note: These figures represent only reported incidents that have been monitored/verified. They are not an official record.



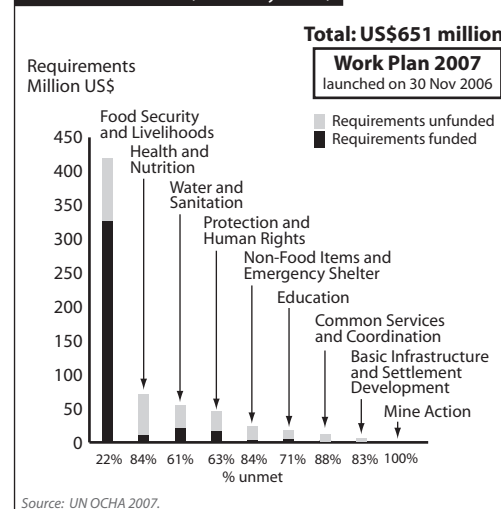
- Routine violence against aid workers: physical and verbal abuse, armed hijackings, often in daylight, even in state capitals.
- Insecurity continues to directly affect humanitarian operations.

Affected Population (Apr 2004 - Apr 2007)



- 2.1 million people, a third of Darfur's population, displaced. At the current rate, the same could be true for more than half the population in about 18 months.

Darfur Work Plan (as of May 2007)



- Of the total US\$1.2 billion in humanitarian requirements for the Work Plan, US\$651 million requested for Darfur.
- 55% of Work Plan requirements have been met with close to 60% of the funding needs for Darfur covered.
- Relatively high coverage of Work Plan requirements reflects a high level of funding for Food Aid activities, whereas other sectors remain significantly under-funded.
